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Rating Risk in the 6 Dimensions 0 – no or very low risk. Stable. 1 – mild discomfort, can be stabilized, functioning restored easily 2 – moderate risk/difficulty functioning but can understand support services 3 – serious difficulties – in or near imminent danger 4 – highest concern – severe, persistent, poor ability

Understanding and Using Current ASAM Criteria

Risk Rating: 2 The patient has some difficulty tolerating and coping with withdrawal discomfort. Intoxication may be severe, but responds to support and treatment sufficiently that the patient does not pose an imminent danger to self or others. 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ASAM Patient Placement Criteria: Supplement on Pharmacotherapies for Alcohol Use Disorders provides a framework for placing patients with alcohol use disorders, using the ASAM criteria. Chapters address pharmacotherapies and behavioral therapies for alcohol withdrawal and for prevention and management of relapse. Case examples bolster understanding of the recommendations made.
