

## On Non Violence Mahatma Gandhi

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Gandhi's political commitment. He was arrested many times. In September 1906 he led his fellow Indians in a nonviolent protest against the policemen who wanted to keep a file on every one of them and he was put in jail for seven years; between 1921 and 1923, he was again imprisoned because he promoted civil rebellion; in 1930 he was put in jail for one year because he illegally produced salt from saltwater to protest against the government monopoly on salt production.

Gandhi's View of Violence / Nonviolence. Gandhi saw violence pejoratively and also identified two forms of violence; Passive and Physical, as we saw earlier.
